



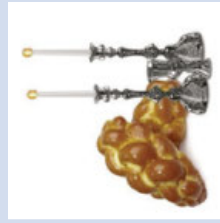

You won't find a traditional synagogue dues structure at Sinai Brookline. In its place, we have adopted **SinaiPromise Membership**.

SinaiPromise Membership is a pledge we make to each other as a community to contribute what we can to support our temple, clergy, and programs. These pledges are the building blocks for our being a *kehillah shel chesed*, a caring, inclusive community.

With this approach, you receive information about the cost of running Sinai Brookline and the average amount each member household would need to contribute to sustain it for the coming year. Members are then asked to contribute what they can to maintain our community.

We invite you to learn more about this exciting alternative to traditional synagogue dues and how you can make your pledge. You can be assured that you will be welcomed warmly no matter the level of financial commitment.

Our Rabbis Are Here for You

As your rabbis, we are here for you, as always, and we hope to be present with you in both times of joy as well as times of sadness. We hope we may offer support, express sympathy, join with you in prayer, celebrate with you, and otherwise be present for you in your life. **In the case of a death in your family**, please notify one of us, even if the funeral is out of town. Please contact us in the case of any kind of illness as well, so we may be helpful to you and your family.

Both our rabbis, Rabbi Andy Vogel and Associate Rabbi Talia Stein, are available for spiritual support for members in life cycle and life crisis moments, officiation at many life cycle events, and consultation on Jewish matters. Rabbi Vogel is often the primary contact in the case of a life event, and Rabbi Stein is also available. Please reach out to us. And, as always, our Caring Network volunteers are available to support you in a variety of ways—let us know how we may be helpful to you.

If you need to change an appointment, please call Paul Kelly in the Temple office. **In an emergency or a death in your family:** If outside regular office hours, please call Rabbi Vogel on his cell phone at 617-257-6848. (Email is less reliable in this instance.)

Temple Sinai honors individual journeys of Judaism, joyfully embracing and connecting our members in community. We are enriched by engaging in lifelong study of Torah, seeking holiness through meaningful worship, and bringing justice, healing and caring to our world. We each aspire to deepen communication, broaden commitments, and gain inspiration bound only by the limits of our dreams.

Be Part of Temple Sinai's Caring Network—It's a Mitzvah!

Temple Sinai's Caring Network is made up of congregants who've agreed to be contacted when another member is facing an important life event—the birth or adoption of a child, a death in the family, or an illness or injury—and needs support. Our volunteers do a variety of tasks: they make phone calls, deliver meals, attend *shivas*, or help out with shopping or errands. Most tasks are **one time only** and volunteers can do as much or as little as they wish.

Our most frequent activity is **providing a meal**, and—although many committed members have signed up to help—given the frequency with which we provide meals (typically 2-4 times each month!), we sometimes have to scramble in order to meet the needs. If you haven't done so already, **please consider adding your name** to our volunteer list. Our goal is 100% member participation. If you're already on our list, **please consider responding** next time a request goes out. (While home-cooked meals are always appreciated, take-out is fine too, and reimbursement is available if needed.) We rely on our volunteers to care for our congregants and your actions are very much appreciated by the recipients.

High Holy Days 5785 Information

The New Year 5785 begins with Rosh Hashanah on the **evening of Wednesday, Oct. 2**, and with Yom Kippur, which begins on **Friday evening, Oct. 11**.

This year, we offer Sanctuary services for all of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. We will also be offering a Tot Service and a Family Service for the mornings of the two holidays, both held in the Weintraub Community Room (see service times to the right). *All services this year are at Temple Sinai, unlike last year.* We are very happy to again provide live video options via Zoom for members and guests who wish to join us remotely for our services in the Sanctuary.

Following public health recommendations, we advise that all individuals be fully vaccinated against COVID-19. The decision about whether to wear a mask is up to each individual and we respect each person's choice about masking.

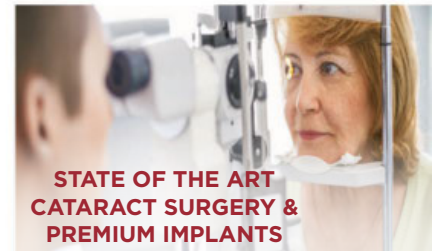

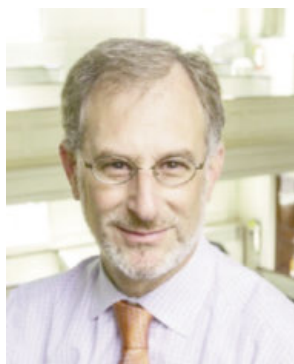
